OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The PBC Foundation is the only organisation in the UK exclusively dedicated to providing free support and information to those affected by Primary Biliary Cholangitis (formerly known as Primary Biliary Cirrhosis), an autoimmune liver condition with no known cause or cure.

The objects for which the charity was established are:

- i) To provide relief for persons suffering from the condition known as Primary Biliary Cholangitis by the setting up and organisation of support groups for the benefit of such persons and their families and by the provision of information about the condition and its treatment.
- ii) To promote research into the condition of Primary Biliary Cholangitis and into any other related areas as the charity may decide and to publish the results thereof, through either the provision, or assistance with the provision, of the necessary finance.
- iii) To advance the education of the public generally about the problems associated with Primary Biliary Cholangitis.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The PBC Foundation is committed to continuous enhancement of the services it provides, information it shares and methods of interaction. It also strives to increase its service users and other audiences to reach out to and help as many people affected by PBC as possible, worldwide. It has proved to be a busy year, in which we worked hard to achieve our objectives in the following ways;

- > Expanding Our Community: Our small, Edinburgh-based team made every effort to reach out and support as many people affected by PBC globally as possible. In 2019, we welcomed 1196 new service users to our Foundation. 665 of those registered were from the UK, whilst 541 joined us from other countries around the world
- > Our Online Presence: We experienced an increased following on social media and rising traffic to our website, which continues to be a key source of information for people around the world.
- Website: 96,361 users in 2019, generating 248,965 page views and resulting in a 20% increase from 2018.
- > Facebook: 4,343 followers. Each post gained an average of 1,710 impressions.
- > Twitter: 2,237 followers. Each tweet gained an average of 773 impressions.
- ➤ International PBC Day: Initially launched by the PBC Foundation in 2012, our campaign for International PBC Day on September the 8th 2019 was #knowyournumbers. 26 events were organised UK-wide. 45% of PBC patients are underdosed so we worked closely with Intercept Pharmaceuticals to highlight the importance of understanding levels and tests results.
- > Growing Our Team: We welcomed a new Grants Officer, Assistant Grants Officer and two volunteer apprentices, who joined us from local Edinburgh College's Foundation Apprenticeship scheme. We continued to invest in our vital volunteer network, recruiting and training seven new volunteers across the UK.
- > The Bear Facts: We continued to provide our quarterly publication to over 11,500 readers. Issues included opportunities to participate in medical trials, interactive 'Q&A' sessions with our Medical Advisory Board, feedback from clinical studies and articles providing information to service users on issues such as bowels, TIPs and Sicca Syndrome.
- ➤ Workshops: We hosted 24 self-management workshops across all four UK nations, providing over 120 with personalised information and experiences. This equipped PBC sufferers with the skills to take an active role in their own care, both mentally and physically.

- ▶ PBC Mobile App: Our app was updated and relaunched in 2019 with greater interactivity for users. Patients are now able to track their symptoms, mood, medicines, and answer surveys consenting to their anonymised data being used to populate a patient registry. They can complete surveys which can be used to drive medical research and drug trials for PBC. We can carry out research which is centred on Patient Reported Experience Measures and Patient Reported Outcome Measures which feed into abstract submissions for improving patient care. To date, whilst the abstract content is confidential, there have already been two abstracts accepted and will be presented in Q1-2 of 2020.
- Medical Conference: In December, we hosted a two day International conference, funded by the Netherlands Liver Trust, about living with PBC, collaboration and developments in therapies. Patient support and advocacy organisations from Macedonia, Sweden, Denmark, Israel, Austria, Portugal, Spain, Italy, Finland and the Netherlands were in attendance.
- Nursing In Practice: We attended twelve Nursing in Practice events. This allowed us to increase awareness of PBC and its debilitating symptoms to over 4,800 medical professionals, and to provide up to date information on PBC and the work of The PBC Foundation.

MONITORING & EVALUATION

In order to ensure that we are addressing the needs of PBC sufferrers as best we can, our work is regulary reviewed by our Board of Directors, Medical Advisory Board, volunteers and service users.

To ensure that our service users and volunteers can feed back to us as openly and honestly as possible, we continued to utilise a wide range of feedback systems, from direct communication to anonymous online surveys. The Volunteers' conference brings together all our UK and Ireland Volunteers and provides a two-way exchange of information, ensuring everything we do is not only patient-centred, but patient driven.

Recent research, used to determine if our services were able to meet EASL recommendations of supporting people with PBC, noted that:-

- 87.6% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing PBC Foundation Services had enable them to better manage their symptoms.
- 88.9% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing PBC Foundation Services had enabled them to make more
 informed decisions about their PBC and its treatment.
- 93.2% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing PBC Foundation Services had made them fell less alone.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our total income was £350,128 (2018 - £338,234) which resulted in a deficit of £ 25,613 (2018 - deficit £42,507). Our funds at 31 December 2019 were £168,057 (2018 - £193,670) of which £48,347 represented unrestricted funds and £119,710 restricted funds.

Grant Making Policy

Research grants are made after advertisement of their availability in the appropriate medical press. Applications are then reviewed by the Foundation's Medical Advisory Committee using a recognised peer review process, in accordance with the Association of Medical Research Charities requirements. The Foundation is a member of AMRC.

Reserves Policy

The purpose of the reserves is to ensure that the PBC Foundation is able to meet its obligations against decline or interruptions in income, which is of particular concern during a recession. The risk to the PBC Foundation's income stream is that the donations may drop in value, and that the support provided by way of sponsorship is discontinued. The Foundation has no stocks or shares to generate income. At year end, we held £48,347 of unrestricted reserves, which equates to approximately six months' running costs. At year end, we also held £119,710 in restricted reserves.

Principal source of funding

FUTURE PLANS

In 2020, we will consolidate on our work in previous years and continue to build upon it, taking time to ensure that we are delivering our core services as effectively as possible. This will happen in the following ways:

- > We will participate in 12 Nursing in Practice events to further raise awareness of the condition in the medical community.
- We will train a minimum of 10 new regional volunteers.
- We will engage in projects with the pharmaceutical industry to enable specific workshops that help people receive appropriate medication: for example, Ursodeoxycholic acid.
- ➤ We will introduce use of the app and EASL guidelines to workshops.
- To give potential volunteers an insight in their responsibilities, we will improve our Volunteer Handbook by including case studies and imagery from our existing volunteers.
- > We will continue to build on our international membership and app engagement.
- > We will continue to create new partnerships.
- > We will submit more abstracts emphasising patient experience and the need for change.
- > To highlight PBC Foundation services, we will continue to present our research at a national and international level.
- We will strive to release translated versions of the app.
- > We will continue to support every patient that needs us in their PBC journey.
- > To safeguard the provision of valuable core services and the continued development of multi-channel communication.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

The PBC Foundation was initially a Charitable Trust, and was established by Deed of Trust granted by the Trustees in November 1996. On 26 of May 2000, the charity was incorporated as a Private Limited Company, which is limited by guarantee, and is governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association. Under this governing document, the Trustees are not permitted to engage in permanent trading activities in the name of the Foundation. Reference and administrative details are shown in the schedule of members of the Board and Professional Advisors in the Financial Statements.

Governance

Our Board of Directors, which governs the organisation, consists of eleven members (four of whom are PBC sufferers) who meet quarterly to ensure that the charity operates in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2007 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2010. Management accounts are prepared and circulated to the Board on a monthly basis.

Additional Committees

- Finance Committee: a quorum of directors with financial experience, supported by specialist financial advisors, who advise the Board of Directors on financial matters.
- Medical Advisory Board: a group of medical experts who advise the Board of Directors on issues relating to medical information, medical advice, and research. They peer review our medical publications and applications for research grants.

Management

The Chief Executive Officer, Collette A Thain MBE, is responsible for the routine management of the organisation. The CEO is accountable to the Board of Trustees.

Risk management

The Trustees evaluate risks to the Foundation at least four times a year. The main risk is that income from donations and fundraising is not sufficient to cover our expenses. The Trustees are ready to take appropriate action in the event that the financial position of the Foundation becomes seriously threatened. Procedures are in place to ensure the compliance with health & safety of staff, volunteers and others.

Staff and volunteers

The charity is grateful for the tireless efforts of its appointed staff and volunteers who are involved in administration, service delivery and fundraising.

Service users and their representation.

We are a community organisation, consisting of almost 13,500 service users in 80 countries worldwide, including 7,000 in the UK, who rely on our services for support and information. As such, we provide support to a third off the estimated 20,000 PBC sufferers in the UK. In order to ensure that our services continue to be provided in the best interests of people diagnosed with PBC we regularly seek feedback, both directly from users and through the 50 regional volunteers at our Annual Volunteers Conference. Further to this our CEO and one other Director, both of whom have PBC, provide representation of these interests on the Board of Directors.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

1. LEGAL STATUS

The charity was incorporated as a private company, limited by guarantee, and governed by its memorandum and articles. The liability of the members is restricted to £1 each.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (2015), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

Income is recognised in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Income is deferred only when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future period.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Legacies are brought into account when the charity is advised of an intended payment or transfer and has a reasonable estimate of the sum involved.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and includes attributable vat which cannot be reclaimed.

Costs of generating funds comprise those costs associated with generating incoming resources from all sources other than undertaking charitable activities. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly as well as costs of an indirect nature.

Charitable activity expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its objectives and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between costs of generating funds and the charitable activities on the basis of management's estimation of staff time or usage with the exception of project officer overheads and magazine costs. Project officer overheads are allocated on grant award budgeted figures and magazine costs are split between Awareness/Helpline and Support activities on a percentage basis. Support costs are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time or usage.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examination fees.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and office equipment - 33% on cost

A part year's depreciation is charged when an asset is purchased during the year.

All fixed assets over £1,000 are initially recorded at cost.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Intangible fixed assets

Amortisation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Intangible fixed assets

- 33% on cost

Amortisation begins when the intangible asset is available for use, ie when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be usable in the manner intended.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined benefit pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Unrestricted funds include designated funds, where the trustees, at their discretion, have created funds for specific purposes.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for specific purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

App project - A project to create a PBC app for service users.

Volunteers' conference - Funding from Awards For All towards the cost of the 2020 annual conference.

Learning portal - Funding from Intercept Practice and Policy for online GP education.
