OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The PBC Foundation is the only organisation in the UK exclusively dedicated to providing free support and information to those affected by Primary Biliary Cholangitis (formerly known as Primary Biliary Cirrhosis), a rare, progressive and autoimmune liver condition with no known cause or cure.

The objects for which the charity was established are:

- i) The relief of persons suffering from the condition known as Primary Biliary Cholangitis by the setting up and organisation of support groups for the benefit of such persons and their families and by the provision of information about the condition and its treatment.
- ii) To promote research into the condition of Primary Biliary Cholangitis and into any other related areas as the charity may decide and to publish the results thereof, through either the provision, or assistance with the provision, of the necessary finance.
- iii) To advance the education of the public generally about the problems associated with Primary Biliary Cholangitis.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The PBC Foundation continues to be committed to the constant improvement of the services it provides, information it shares, methods of interaction and the extent of its outreach. It was another busy year for us, in which we worked hard to achieve our objectives and made many notable achievements. The Covid 19 pandemic continued to bring great uncertainty and we continually reviewed the changing needs and challenges of our membership.

- Expanding our community: Our small, Edinburgh-based team made every effort to reach out and support as many people affected by PBC globally as possible. In 2021, we welcomed 917 new service users to our Foundation. 448 of those registered were from the UK, whilst 469 joined us from other countries around the world.
- Our online presence: We experienced an increased following on social media and rising traffic to our website, which continues to be a key source of information for people around the world.
- > Website: 102,800 users in 2021.
- Global reach: Strong digital engagement and 121,400 people reached with up-to-date and accurate information.
- ▶ Helpline calls: We strive to provide the most up-to-date accurate information to all our members and their support network of family and friends. To deal with this demand, we have maintained our 24/7 helpline services via our telephone line, emails and across our social media platforms. Throughout 2021 our staff have dealt with 3,165 helpline calls.
- Online services: What has come to the fore, from patients' comments, is that they needed help to break their isolation, their feelings of hopelessness and helplessness. In 2020 we restructured and provided a number of new digital services. Throughout 2021 these services have grown in strength and support and continue to adapt and develop to meet the needs of members. Digital services include:
 - Webinars (every Tuesday and Thursday) with Medical Professionals and guest speakers.
 - Facebook Lives Monday and Wednesday Informal online coffee and a chit-chat.
- ➤ Facebook Live: During 2021 we hosted 175 Facebook Live interactive chats. An informal format where either our Head of Education and Development or our CEO hosts a chat with service users typing their responses. The videos are live and are recorded and shared afterwards. The sessions are interactive and light-hearted. The staff and members take part in quizzes, sing-alongs, chatter etc., which injects some fun and variety into the day whilst relieving stress and anxiety. This is proving a huge benefit to all sufferers particularly those who feel fear, uncertainty or isolation; through lack of family, or are experiencing shielding, quarantine or Covid-related social-isolation.

- Webinars: In 2021 we hosted 72 webinars; 49 Q&A Healthcare webinars and 23 Interactive self-management online sessions adapting our face-to-face workshops for a wider reach. On Tuesdays the sessions are hosted by our Head of Education and Development and CEO and cover many aspects of self-management physical, emotional and psychological whilst living with PBC during the Covid era. Thursday sessions cover the latest Covid-19 news and any specialised medical information to PBC sufferers in a live, interactive Q&A format. These webinars are vital to show how varied the PBC journey is and how heterogenous PBC is, as a disease. These sessions are with our CEO, a patient of some 26 years and a pre-eminent PBC specialist, virologist, etc.
- Academic Conferences: Due to feedback, we have successfully submitted a number of abstracts to recent academic conferences, including EASL (European Association for study of the Liver) and ASSLD (American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases). These abstracts highlight the unmet need in the patient populations using both PREMS (Patient Reported Experience Measures) and PROMS (Patient Reported Outcome Measures). This feedback tells us that it is important to cover topics such as diagnosis, Urso response, symptom treatment, second-line therapies, and the importance of clinical trial opportunities being afforded to patients; these topics will be covered frequently within the programme.
- > International PBC Day: 2021 was the year to take what we knew, and to share it with the PBC community in bite-size chunks. As ever, there was a vastly knowledgeable, well respected international guest list who shared with you their knowledge. We released an entire series of short videos (under 15 minutes each) which covered a wide range of topics and saved them onto our YouTube channel. We drew upon our very successful "Word of the Day" and "Myth busting" campaigns from social media and shared these on our social media channels. The first section we released were the "PBC and..." range of videos. PBC and Itch. PBC and Pregnancy. PBC and Men. PBC and Liver Tests. PBC and Urso response. PBC and Transplant. As promised, PBC Day is not just for PBC Day so we continue to add to these videos. The second series we shared with you was "This is PBC". Again, approximately 10 minutes long, this is a series of introductions to PBC with slides in English and the voiceover in a range of languages from local doctors. The third series of videos was "PBC in my Locale". Now, for some the word "Locale" may mean country. For others, it may mean state or region. For others again, it may mean the Hospital. What we hope we have achieved is to show you best practice in your locale so that you are empowered to ensure you experience this best practice in your own PBC journey. We have the opportunity to make a difference together. The videos and information are invaluable so we can build up a great resource bank to help all affected by PBC. On the day itself even if members were in the tightest lockdown imaginable, they could still have the opportunity to join, to watch, to learn
- PBC TV: We created an easy to navigate central resource of video presentations that explains the most pertinent FAQs and topics relative to PBC, accessible remotely by the worldwide community. International PBC Day's series of videos is presented by leading global PBC experts and provides a launch pad for the ongoing provision of vital education to our community on relevant and current topics. These videos allow those affected by PBC to learn from, to read others' questions, and to know there are thousands around the world who share your fears, your knowledge, and your experiences.

- The Bear Facts: We continued to provide our quarterly publication to over 12,000 readers. Issues included opportunities to participate in medical trials, interactive 'Q&A' sessions with our Medical Advisory Board, feedback from clinical studies and articles providing information to service users on issues such as bowels, TIPs and Sicca Syndrome.
- ▶ PBC Mobile App: Our app is continually being updated with greater interactivity for users. Patients are now able to track their symptoms, mood and medicines, and answer surveys contributing anonymised data being used to populate a patient registry. Patients can complete surveys which can be used to drive medical research and drug trials for PBC. We can carry out research which is centred on Patient Reported Experience Measures and Patient Reported Outcome Measures which feed into abstract submissions for improving patient care.

- Digital Services Survey: When the COVID pandemic emerged and continued to dictate our way of living, we had to adapt to design and deliver new online and remote services. This was to ensure patients could continue to access our invaluable core services whilst receiving new and enhanced support from the Foundation to overcome the added burdens of increased isolation and limited access to healthcare practitioners and treatment. The feedback we have received within our survey has been overwhelmingly positive and will help us to shape services going forward.
- 53.06% state that their online usage had increased or greatly increased during the Covid pandemic.
- 80.58% felt accessing PBC Services reduced their sense of isolation
- Accessing PBC Services has helped me manage my symptoms. 56.02% agreed, 27.08% strongly agreed
- 95.04% felt the PBC Foundation's online services have empowered the PBC community
- 79.01% felt the PBC Foundation's online services have empowered you individually

Of those who have been diagnosed for two years or less;

- 88.89% felt accessing PBC Services has reduced their sense of isolation
- 88.71% accessing PBC Services has helped them manage their symptoms
- 93.65% accessing PBC Services has helped them make more informed decisions about their PBC care.
- · 85.94% believe the online services has empowered them individually
- 93.33% feel the App has empowered the PBC community

Most of these sufferers have had to deal with being newly diagnosed then live through the Covid-19 pandemic with limited or no access to their Doctor. This data shows how invaluable and important the PBC Foundation is for providing up to date and accurate information and support, especially in these uncertain of times.

Of those who attended a Live Chit Chat session during the Covid pandemic;

- 61.73% access PBC at least once a week or more
- 100% believe online services has empowered the PBC community
- 95% feel empowered individually by the online sessions

Of those who attended a Clinician Q&A online session during the Covid pandemic;

- 63.16% access PBC at least once a week or more
- · 98.95% believe online services has empowered the PBC community
- 94.74% feel empowered individually by the online sessions

It is clear to see that as we have faced the toughest 20 months of many of our lives online and digital support has been a real lifeline to many. Many have had to become more tech knowledgeable and face a scary unknown world to their norm but overall it is clear that to many the positive have overtaken the negatives. Online digital activities and communities have been created and hopefully are here to stay to benefit many.

MONITORING & EVALUATION

In order to ensure that we are addressing the needs of PBC sufferers as best we can, our work is regularly reviewed by our Board of Directors, Medical Advisory Board, volunteers and service users.

To ensure that our service users and volunteers can feed back to us as openly and honestly as possible, we continued to utilize a wide range of feedback systems, from direct communication to anonymous online surveys.

Recent research, used to determine if our services were able to meet EASL recommendations of supporting people with PBC, noted that:

- 83.8% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing PBC Foundation Services had enabled them to manage their symptoms better.
- 93.65% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing PBC Foundation services had enabled them to make more informed decisions about their PBC and its treatment.
- 90.6% either agreed or strongly agreed that accessing the PBC Foundation services had reduced their sense of isolation.

Additionally, service users tell us in their own words how grateful they are for the support and information that we provide:

FINANCIAL REVIEW

This year, our total income was £358,108 (2020 - £384,325) which resulted in a surplus of £29,513 (2020 - £58,753). Our funds at 31 December 2021 were £256,323 (2020 -£226,810) of which £158,428 (2020 - £91,194) represented unrestricted funds and £97,895 (2020 - £135,616) restricted funds.

Grant Making Policy

Research grants are made after advertisement of their availability in the appropriate medical press. Applications are then reviewed by the Foundation's Medical Advisory Committee using a recognised peer review process, in accordance with the Association of Medical Research Charities requirements.

Reserves Policy

The purpose of the reserves is to ensure that the PBC Foundation is able to meet its obligations against decline or interruptions in income, which is of particular concern during a recession. The risk to the PBC Foundation's income stream is that the donations may drop in value, and that the support provided by way of sponsorship is discontinued. The Foundation has no stocks or shares to generate income. At year end, we held £158,428 of unrestricted reserves, which equates to approximately six months' running costs. At year end, we also held £97,895 restricted reserves.

Principal source of funding

FUTURE PLANS

In 2022, we shall continue our online services but shall also aim to bring back physical services, as Covid-19 allows. Our intentions are to:

- Continue to recruit and train new regional volunteers.
- > Train and support volunteers on a number of volunteer-specific issues, e.g. holding local meetings F2F and online.
- > Engage with a wide range of stakeholders to drive forward improvements in the daily quality of life for PBC patients.
- > Highlight use of the App and lay guidelines at workshops and online sessions.
- > Build and support our UK and international membership and its App engagement.
- Partner with the pharmaceutical industry to develop surveys highlighting the patient experience, and unmet needs.
- Produce further data, e.g. in abstract form, from the App, to improve the patient experience.
- Highlight PBC Foundation services across all media channels. We will continue to present our research at a national and international level.
- > Release translated versions of the App.
- Continue to support all those affected by PBC.
- Continue to represent the patient voice on national and international committees.
- Publish a series of PBC videos incorporating medical professionals from a number of countries to address gaps in patient knowledge, as highlighted by patients.
- Participate proactively at the EASL and BASL annual meetings.
- > Attend physical patient organisation collaborative meetings (e.g. LPI annual conference in Europe).
- To safeguard the provision of valuable core services and the continued development of multi-channel communication. Unrestricted reserves contain 'designated funds' allocating specific amounts towards certain activities in 2022, as follows:

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE & MANAGEMENT

The PBC Foundation was initially a Charitable Trust and was established by deed of trust granted by the Trustees in November 1996. On 26 May 2000, the charity was incorporated as a Private Limited Company, which is limited by guarantee, and is governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association. Under this governing document, the Trustees are not permitted to engage in permanent trading activities in the name of the Foundation. Reference and administrative details are shown in the schedule of members of the Board and Professional Advisors in the Financial Statements.

Governance

Our Board of Directors, which governs the organisation, consists of nine members (four of whom are PBC sufferers) who meet quarterly to ensure that the organisation operates in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2007 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2010. Management accounts are prepared and circulated to the Board on a monthly basis.

Additional Committees

- Finance Committee: quorum of directors with financial experience, supported by specialist financial advisors, who advise the Board of Directors on financial matters.
- Medical Advisory Board: group of medical experts who advise the Board of Directors on issues
 relating to medical information, medical advice, and research. They peer review our medical
 publications, and applications for research grants.

Management

The Chief Executive Officer, Collette A Thain MBE, is responsible for the routine management of the organisation. The CEO is accountable to the Board of Directors.

Risk management

The Trustees evaluate risks to the Foundation at least four times a year. The main risk is that income from donations and fundraising is not sufficient to cover our expenses. The Trustees are ready to take appropriate action in the event that the financial position of the Foundation becomes seriously threatened. Procedures are in place to ensure the compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and others.

Staff and volunteers

The charity is grateful for the tireless efforts of its appointed staff and volunteers who are involved in administration, service delivery and fundraising.

Service users and their representation

We are a community organisation, consisting of over 13,800 service users in 80 countries worldwide, including 8,000 In the UK, who rely on our services for support and information. As such, we provide support to a third of the estimated 20,000 PBC sufferers in the UK. In order to ensure that our services continue to be provided in the best interests of people diagnosed with PBC we regularly seek feedback, both directly from users and through the 50 regional volunteers at our Annual Volunteers' Conference. Further to this our CEO and three other Directors, all of whom have PBC, provide representation of these interests on the Board of Directors.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are also the Directors of The PBC Foundation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report, and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and UK Accounting Standards.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company. In preparing these statements, the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP.
- Make judgements and estimates which are reasonable and prudent.
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.
- Safeguard the assets of the charitable company, and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the Trustees are aware:

- There is no relevant information of which the charitable company's independent examiner is unaware.
- The Trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant information, and to establish that the independent examiner is aware of that information.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2021

1. LEGAL STATUS

The charity was incorporated as a private company, limited by guarantee, and governed by its memorandum and articles. The liability of the members is restricted to £1 each.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (2015), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

Income is recognised in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Income is deferred only when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future period.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Legacies are brought into account when the charity is advised of an intended payment or transfer and has a reasonable estimate of the sum involved.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and includes attributable vat which cannot be reclaimed.

Costs of generating funds comprise those costs associated with generating incoming resources from all sources other than undertaking charitable activities. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly as well as costs of an indirect nature.

Charitable activity expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its objectives and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between costs of generating funds and the charitable activities on the basis of management's estimation of staff time or usage with the exception of project officer overheads and magazine costs. Project officer overheads are allocated on grant award budgeted figures and magazine costs are split between Awareness/Helpline and Support activities on a percentage basis. Support costs are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time or usage.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examination fees.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and office equipment

- 33% on cost

A part year's depreciation is charged when an asset is purchased during the year. All fixed assets over £1,000 are initially recorded at cost.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Intangible fixed assets

Amortisation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Intangible fixed assets

- 33% on cost

Amortisation begins when the intangible asset is available for use, ie when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be usable in the manner intended.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined benefit pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Unrestricted funds include designated funds, where the trustees, at their discretion, have created funds for specific purposes.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for specific purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Transfers Between Funds

Transfers were made from unrestricted funds to restricted funds during the year to cover excess expenditure on these funds.

Unrestricted Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company.

Certain of the unrestricted fund balances have been used to create designated funds. These are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

The designation does not represent a restriction upon the use of these funds but represents the intention of the trustees regarding utilisation of the charity's resources.

The nature and purpose of the various unrestricted funds are noted as follows:

Volunteer Support-For costs of ongoing support, training and online support.

PBC Day- To cover the costs of the annual PBC Day event.

App-Research and Promotion - For costs of research and promotion of the PBC app.

Monthly Bulletin- For staff costs and distribution costs of the monthly bulletin.

PBC Conference- For costs of the end of year members conference.

Website - To cover the costs of updating graphics and images, rolling banners and buttons.

Social Media – For costs relating to creation of brand -publication of new graphics, new logos and promotional tiles.

Leaflets - For costs to update all 4 existing leaflets design and content in both hard copy and digital format.

Restricted Funds

The nature and purpose of the various restricted funds are noted as follows:

Research – To promote research into the condition of Primary Biliary Cholangitis and any other related conditions.

The Bear Facts - Publication of the quarterly magazine.

Workshops - Funding of self-management workshops for service users.

Nursing in Practice- Funding towards the cost of a Nursing In Practice event in Cardiff.

Volunteer training – Funding to assist in face to face and online training of volunteers to assist with the PBC Foundation.

App project - A project to create a PBC app for service users.

Volunteers' conference - Funding toward the cost of the annual conference.

Learning portal - Funding from Intercept Practice and Policy for online GP education.

Helpline and Online Services – Funding to assist in the provision of services to members via various platforms on a 24/7 basis.

Webinars and Facebook Sessions – Funding to support the provision of weekly Tuesday webinars hosted by our Head of Education and Development and CEO, Thursday live, interactive Q&A webinars and informal Facebook sessions.

Website Improvements - Funding to assist in the first stage of improvements to the PBC website.
